	Exemplar response: In a command economy central government and not the markets direct the allocation of scarce resources (1). For example, whether or not to produce more nuclear power and less healthcare is planned and prioritised by government officials (1). How and what goods and services are produced and by which producers are not, as in free markets, decided by consumers but through government preferences (1). The command economy thus restricts the autonomy of individual units to the extent that decisions on the use of resources must occur with political objectives set (1).

Exemplar response: A VAT of 20 percent of annual turnover represents a significant tax burden for a small business such as MMS Ltd, especially if its turnover over successive financial years has remained below the fiscal threshold pertaining to those years [L1]. It is likely that all areas of MMS Ltd's activities, including its client base, service provision, physical resources and skills sets will have reached a degree of equilibrium around a lower value of turnover. [L2] So exceeding this threshold annual turnover is likely to pose a significant threat to MMS Ltd's activities [L3]. Particularly if, as with most small businesses, there is insufficient liquidity to defray this tax payment or, as the case study alludes to, the local bank refuses to provide the business with the needed cash injection [L4]. Having understood from a client survey the relationship between car ownership and the hourly rate at which MMS Ltd should charge its services, this decision by the City Council will have a negative impact on its prestige car service offerings [L2] potentially leading to a decrease in revenue [L3]. However, the impact on demand MMS Ltd's services by high performance car owners might be minimal depending on the rate of the increase on congestion charges [L4]. Likewise, the shift in the balance of MMS Ltd's service provision – whether or not it will need to provide fewer repair services and more diagnostic services, or vice versa – will also not be immediately obvious [L4]. Exemplar response: An aging and underdeveloped public transport infrastructure can contribute to an increased car ownership [L1]. This is likely to lead to an increase in demand for car repairs [L2] and therefore an increase in the market size of car repairs [L3]. Likewise, while the establishment of congestion zones is likely to reduce car usage within the congestion zone itself, this may increase car usage in areas which, although located outside the congestion zone, still lie within the city boundaries [L3]. Exemplar response: Complying with this particular directive is likely to impact on MMS Ltd's activities in terms of cost and administration [L1]. To ensure compliance with the Directive, the UK Health and Safety Executive will require MMS Ltd to have in place a rigorous set of safeguarding practices and procedures [L2] capable of verifying and maintaining the prescribed limits of isocyanates used in its paint products [L2]. Establishing this system will demand the full commitment of Levi and his employees as well as the training of an employee who will be the designated Health and Safety Officer for MMS Ltd increasing running costs [L3]. As small businesses are particularly vulnerable to cash flow shortages, the burden of administering and successfully navigating a visit from the HSE will be felt acutely, [L3] as will the potential risk to which the small business is naturally exposed during such visits [L3]. While the overall impact of periodic visits such as that by the HSE is arguably necessary in terms of contributing to the general health and wellbeing of MMS Ltd's employees and the local community, the overall costs of compliance against these potential health and well-being benefits are more difficult to justify [L4].
