### **London teachers on one-day strike over pensions**



Thousands of teachers in London went on strike on 28 March, 2012 over changes to pensions, a union has said.

The National Union of Teachers (NUT) said the action was the 'next step' in the pensions campaign.

paying more and receiving less when they retire. The Department for Education (DfE) said the action was "completely irresponsible".

Last November 18342 schools were closed across the UK when public sector workers, including teachers, walked out over pensions reform.

Christine Blower, General Secretary of the NUT, said: "Teachers cannot be expected to just accept government proposals to cut pensions without a justifiable reason."

She added that there was need for further action as concessions from the Government following strikes in June and November 2011 did "not go far enough". The Union said about 50 000 of its members who work in London will be affected by the proposed changes to the pensions scheme.

#### **'Good as it gets'**

A DfE spokesperson said: "The decision to strike is completely irresponsible and won't get teachers any further forward. The deal on the table is as good as it gets and talks are not going to be reopened. Most people will struggle to understand why NUT's leadership is rejecting a good offer which guarantees their own members a far better pension than the vast majority of people in the country will ever get."

**The United Nations (UN) Decade on Bio-Diversity 2011–2020**

Millions of people depend on the world's oceans for food, health and livelihoods and many claim that our oceans are being damaged by pollution and overfishing. Conservationists hope that the UN will try to stop the exploitation of deep sea resources.

In 2012 Greenpeace activists dived to the bottom of the Indian Ocean and unfurled a sign with the words "India, Protect Our Oceans Now!". This was to highlight the need to protect sea waters. They chose the Indian Ocean because India took over the presidency of the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) until 2014.

A representative of the group said: "The Indian government should take a leading role in promoting protection of the oceans."

The Convention aims to halve the rate of habitat loss, expanding water and land areas under conservation and preventing the extinction of species on the threatened list.

Reduce, re-use and recycle	Recycled content of toilet paper and kitchen towel was good.  Cereal boxes – no recycled content.  Carrier bag recycling was available in-store but no facilities for recycling other items.	C
Sustainable farming	Organic food freely available and promoted well. Animal welfare: excellent. 95% of own-brand products surveyed were fairly traded.	A
Overall comments and grade	The Co-op scores highly in some areas but fell down in others such as recycled content. The Co-op needs to improve the information it gives to its customers in its shops about where food comes from and what products contain.	C
