The specification details the content and key knowledge, issues for discussion and suggested scholarly views, academic approaches and sources of authority.

The 'content' column details the focus of each topic and provides information on the main areas of study. 'Key knowledge' provides details of the knowledge expected of students.


Each topic ends with a section detailing discussion points. While it is expected that discussions on these topics will range wildly, the listed points are considered to be central debates and issues appropriate for assessment.

Exam questions can be set on the content, key knowledge and discussion points. The specification also explains aspects of assessment in A Level RS. It is your starting point and is useful for planning, both long and medium term, along with individual lessons.
