# Your guide to the changes for 2021

Following an Ofqual consultation in July 2020, we made changes to a number of our qualifications. These changes would have applied to the summer 2021 examinations, had they gone ahead. After a further consultation, Ofqual confirmed the changes will now apply to the autumn 2021 examinations.

Please use the specification on our website alongside the information below, which explains how this qualification will differ in autumn 2021.

## Overview of changes for GCSE (9-1) English Literature

For students taking OCR GCSE (9–1) English Literature in autumn 2021:

The **Shakespeare component** will be **compulsory**.

- Centres will be able to choose which 2 of the 3 other components (modern prose or drama, 19th century prose or poetry) students will be assessed on.
- We have split the J352/01 and J352/02 question papers into four papers one for each area of content. Each paper has a new component code.
- There will be no changes to the question types in the exam.
- Students that take the modern prose or drama or poetry options will be assessed on an unseen comparison and will respond to part a and part b questions as they would in a standard year.
- For the compulsory Shakespeare component and the 19th century prose option, students will continue to have a choice of questions: an extract-based question or a discursive essay question.

## GCSE (9-1) English Literature for autumn 2021

Students must complete Component 22, Shakespeare and two of the optional components (11, 12, 21) to be awarded the GCSE (9-1) in English Literature in autumn 2021.

#### Modern prose or drama

This is an optional component.

Reading and responding to one studied modern prose or drama text, including making connections with a thematically linked unseen

#### 19th century prose

This is an optional component.

Reading and responding to one studied 19th century novel.

#### Poetry across time

This is an optional component.

Reading and responding to one studied thematic poetry cluster from the OCR Poetry Anthology, including making connections with a thematically linked unseen poem.

- The exam timing for the compulsory Shakespeare component and 19th century prose option is 50 minutes, an increase of 5 minutes on the recommended timing for these sections in a standard year.
- There is no change to the exam timing for the modern prose or drama and poetry options.

### What has changed – Specification

Revised Assessment Objective weightings per component for autumn 2021

#### Detail

As students will be assessed on 3 rather than 4 areas of study, each area of study will be weighted at 33.33% of the total GCSE, rather than at 25%.

To meet the requirement that Assessment Objective 4 (AO4) counts for 5% of the total GCSE, no matter which optional route students take, we will only be assessing AO4 in the compulsory Shakespeare component in autumn 2021.

The assessment of AO4 in the Shakespeare component will increase from 4 to 6 marks out of a total of 40 for the question so that it carries 5% weighting across the whole qualification (6/120 marks). The weighting of AO1 in Shakespeare has decreased slightly to accommodate this change. AO1 and AO2 remain the dominant assessment objectives for this question.

The assessment of AO4 will be removed from the 19th century prose component. The total number of marks for the 19th century prose question will remain at 40. The weighting of AO2 and AO3 has increased slightly to accommodate this change. AO1 and AO2 remain the dominant assessment objectives for this question.

There are no changes to the assessment objectives or their weightings in either the modern prose or drama or poetry options.
