	0 = nil response or response not worthy of credit		
	MB1 (1 – 3 marks) The response shows a limited understanding of the potential benefits of holding a major sporting event. Candidates provide simple descriptions of a few points from the indicative content. No attempt is made at evaluation and there may be some irrelevant material in the answer. There is little or no use of technical vocabulary and sentences have limited coherence and structure. Errors in grammar, punctuation and spelling may be noticeable and intrusive. MB2 (4 – 6 marks) The response shows an understanding of the potential benefits of holding a major sporting event. Candidates make some valid points from the indicative content with good knowledge and understanding. Some attempt at evaluation is made, which may include the use of one or more of the developed points in order to gauge the value of the benefit(s). There is some use of technical vocabulary and sentences for the most part are relevant and are coherent. There are occasional errors in grammar, punctuation and spelling.
